

Kindergarten

I can't believe that our Kindergarten students have nearly completed their first year at "Big School". They regularly amaze me at the wonderful progress that they have all made both academically and socially. Thank you to everyone who continued to read with their children during the holidays — reading every day with children is definitely the key to ensuring their future successes both in and out of the school environment. It was fantastic to read with students in Week 1 of this term and see that a few students had even improved over the short holiday break.

Over the next four weeks until the end of Week 5, Kindergarten are very fortunate to have the assistance of Mardi Casley who is a second year teaching student from Wagga University. Having an extra pair of hands in the classroom definitely improves learning opportunities for all students so this is a real positive for the Kindergarten class.

Next Wednesday, 4th November will be the final Kindergarten Orientation for students commencing in 2010. The 2009 Kindergarten students have thoroughly enjoyed these orientation days and have loved being the "big kids" where they have eagerly helped the pre-school students with numerous challenging tasks and activities!

The Kindergartens are continuing to gain some excellent skills on the SmartBoard and are showing increased confidence in using it independently. Each day students use the SmartBoard to discover what they will be learning for the day in our daily timetable and also to keep our calendar up to date. We have also just commenced having a goal for the day to focus on such as "Always Try Your Best".

In Term 4, each morning in the Kindergarten room will again be devoted to literacy. Sounds and high frequency (tricky) words are continually revisited through various games, music and hands on activities. Using the SmartBoard, children are given individual instructions to find a tricky word, and word blend or word ending from somewhere in the room and then they are required to come up with as many other words containing this blend or ending that they can and write them down, eg. 'ed' - red, bed and 'gl' - glance, glue. We are thrilled to have Mrs Maryanne Ritchie come into the room each Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday morning from 11:15am - 12pm to assist with guided reading activities whereby students are put into groups based on individual reading levels and then given subsequent books and activities to assist them in improving their reading skills.

In mathematics, students are becoming very proficient at understanding simple fractions and are working hard on their knowledge of 'friends of ten', eg. 9 + 1 = 10; 6 + 4 = 10, etc. They are thoroughly enjoying playing various card games that promote numerical sequencing and addition skills and are extremely competitive and accurate when it comes to being the first to answer a given question!

Keep up the great work Kindergarten, and parents and friends please remember to come and visit our room at anytime – we would love to see you all!

Year One/Two

Welcome back everyone to Term 4. It is lovely to see all students back at school refreshed and eager to learn. Firstly, I would like to congratulate Year One/Two on their efforts so far this term. All students have been working hard and this has been evident in the quality of their work. Well done Year One/Two. Keep up the fantastic work!

In Maths this term, we are looking more closely at length, 3D shapes and volume and capacity. Year One/Two have seemed to have had lots of fun 'playing' with geometric solids, photographing and evaluating 3D shapes and making and measuring plasticine snakes. Maths groups will continue



every Friday so if any parents would like to come in to help please feel free to do so.

We will be starting explanations this week, followed by poetry. Well done to Year One/Two on their improved handwriting and reading skills. They are all trying so hard!



Our mathematics session during week one was spent completing revision work which was very successful and met with enthusiasm by the students. Tanner Reynolds can be quoted as







Taming Your Fussy Eater

Many young children (and older children, adolescents and even adults!) can be 'fussy eaters'. This can cause a lot of worry for parents, but there are some key points to keep in mind when managing this behaviour. It might seem easier to give in and serve chicken nuggets every night, but be persistent and don't give up! Missing a meal occasionally will not harm your child and is more likely to teach them better eating habits for the future. Keep on serving your child the same healthy meal each night that the rest of the family is eating. If you don't offer your child vegetables, then they won't be able to start eating vegetables!

Praise your child for trying a new food, but keep fuss to a minimum. If your child doesn't eat everything on his or her plate, quietly remove the plate at the end of the meal without comment. If enough food is left, cover and put in the fridge. If your child is hungry later, the leftovers can be reoffered.

Treating your child as a fussy eater by telling them "You won't like that" will only cause your child to become even more fussy with food.

Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998

The Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 makes it an offence for a person convicted of a serious sex offence (a prohibited person) or a Registrable Person under the Child Protection(Offenders Registration) Act 2000 to apply for, undertake or remain in, child-related employment. It does not apply if an order from the Industrial Relations Commission or the Administrative Decisions Tribunal, declares that the Act does not apply to a particular person.

Section 5 of the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 defines a serious sex offence as an offence involving sexual activity or acts of indecency that was committed in NSW and that was punishable by penal servitude or imprisonment of 12 months or more even if the sentence was not served, or, an offence involving sexual activity or acts of indecency that was committed elsewhere and that would have been an offence punishable by penal servitude or imprisonment for 12 months or more if it had been committed in NSW.

Child-related employment means any employment that primarily involves direct contact with children where that contact is not directly supervised. Section 1 of the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 specifies that child-related employment is employment:

- involving the provision of child protection services
- in pre-schools, kindergartens and child care centres (including residential child care centres)
- in schools or other educational institutions (not including universities)
- in detention centres (within the meaning of the Child (Detention Centres) Act 1987)
- in refuges used by children
- in wards of public or private hospitals in which children are patients
- in clubs, associations or movements (including of a cultural, recreational or sporting nature) having a significant child membership
- in any religious organisation
- in any entertainment venues where the clientele is primarily children
- as a babysitter or childminder that is arranged by a commercial agency
- involving fostering or other child care
- involving regular provision of taxi services for the transport of children with a disability
- involving the private tuition of children
- involving the direct provision of health services
- involving the provision of counselling or other support services for children
- on school buses
- · at overnight camps for children.

Under this Act:

- it is an offence for a prohibited person to apply for, undertake or remain in child-related employment
- employers must ask existing employees, both paid and unpaid, and preferred applicants for employment to declare
 whether they are a prohibited person or not
- all child-related employees must inform their employers if they are a 'prohibited person' or remove themselves from child-related employment. A prohibited person is someone who has been convicted of a serious sexual offence or, who has had a finding for a charge of serious sexual offence proven in court, even if a conviction was not recorded.
- penalties are imposed for non compliance.

I am aware that I am ineligible to apply for, undertake or remain in, child-related employment if I have been convicted of a "serious sex offence" as defined in the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 or if I am a "Registrable Person" under the Child Protection (Offenders Registration) Act 2000. I have read and understood the above information in relation to the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 and understand my responsibilities and obligations under this Act.

I declare that I am not a person prohibited by the Act from seeking, undertaking, or remaining in child-related employment.





Swine Flu H1N1 Vaccine

A free vaccine is now available to protect against swine flu. Anyone can have the vaccination however doctors are recommending that it is particularly important for people who are at increased risk of severe illness from influenza.

This includes.

- * people with underlying health conditions such as asthma, heart disease, cancer and diabetes
- * pregnant women
- carers of infants up to 6 months old
- * people who are severely obese
- * indigenous Australians
- *frontline health workers
- * community care workers

The vaccine is an injection in the upper arm, only one dose is required and it should last for 12 months. Children under 10 years cannot receive the vaccine. A vaccine for them is currently being trialled.
