Literacy

This term the students have been undertaking Accelerated Literacy. They have studied the text 'A Visit from Nicholas' better known as 'The Night Before Christmas'. The students have been exploring the poem in detail including what the words mean and the history of the poem.

Science

In Week 2 of this term we found out the answers to the 'Collie's Garden Party' problem. The students became very interested and active in solving this problem. Everyone should feel proud of completing this task as some of the clues were tricky and even prouder as we chose all the correct animals.

Waste Wise Watchers

Kindergarten and Year One/Two participated in a visiting waste wise program. The students learned

about what items you can reuse and recycle and which items can be put in the rubbish bin, recycling bin and compost. The students listened to a talk and then got to played games which involved sorting items into the correct bin and using clues to guess the recyclable item.

High School not so Scary

Our fabulous students in Year 6 completed their last day of their transition to high school on Tuesday. All students have had the opportunity to explore the possibilities in the gamut of subjects they can expect to undertake during their secondary careers. Students were able to experience public speaking in English, Geographical fieldwork, experience archaeology, build spinning tops in Design and Technology and work on portraits in Art.

All students involved should be commended on their outstanding application and behaviour across the day. Our secondary teachers are all extremely excited to start teaching this group in the coming year.

Crossroads

Students in Year 10 and 11 were involved in the mandatory Crossroads program this week, learning about road safety. This program was well supported by the students that attended and allowed students to gather important information about the best way to protect themselves while using our roads.

Secondary students have finished their work with Vicky Lowry. The students have created some outstanding pieces of art. Currently the wax and print canvas work is adorning the surfaces of the Miss Wait's office.

Study is key

All students in Years 7-9 have their yearly exams in the upcoming week. We advise all students to take the exams seriously and revise consistently for all subjects. Students will be sitting exams for English, Mathematics, Science and PDHPE.

Strike Out!

As part of the revival of the SRC the organisation Second Strike worked with our student leaders next Friday. We hope that as part of this day all students gained valuable leadership skills that will help enhance the role of the SRC in the school.

Year Seven and Eight Science

Students are busily preparing for their end of year exams. In the final unit this year students will be investigating the formation of the universe including the planets, galaxies and more specifically the planet earth. They have constructed a model solar system and investigated the distances involved in space. In the coming weeks they will investigate the composition of planets, what causes the seasons and tides. I look forward to finalising this unit towards the end of the year.

Year Nine Science

Students have been completing a unit on coordination and the body's senses. In this unit they have been investigating how the nervous and endocrine system work together to coordinate our bodies. They have been required to complete a model showing the function of hormones and their roles in growth, development and reproduction. As they finalise the year students will be working on acids and bases in the environment. I hope they are all studying hard in preparation for their final exams. Many students submitted their assessment tasks on science and the media. These will be marked and returned in the coming days. I hope all parents take the opportunity to look at their child's work including their yearly exams and this assessment to see how they are progressing in science.

Year Twelve Agriculture

Students are currently completing their farm product study. They have looked specifically at the wine industry, and its importance to the Australian economy. They will complete an assessment to determine the market factors that influence the supply and demand of wine and wine grapes. Students have recently travelled to Andrew Peace Wines to assist with their understanding of the processes involved in producing and selling wine grapes.

Year Twelve Biology

Students are currently working on the unit 'Maintaining a Balance'. In this unit they will study the body's response to changes in the environment, and how both Australian plants and animals cope with temperature extremes. In the coming weeks students will investigate the transport mechanisms including blood and its products, and the xylem and phloem in plants. Following this they will investigate the excretory systems and regulations of waste. The assessment due date has changed because of the Sydney excursion and will now be due in Week 9. Students will also complete a topic test during this week to assess their understanding of the first unit. The topic test will not contribute to their final grades. I look forward to working with students to understand the difficult topics studied in Biology.

Primary Industries

The school farm is slowing down this year and some planning is going into next year. There are a couple of areas that we would greatly appreciate assistance with, mainly with the donation of some chicken wheat. If any families are willing to donate some grain following harvest this would reduce the costs associated with feeding the chickens.

This class has also established a vegetable garden to grow over the summer. The aim is to sell much of the produce at the start of next term. With the improved rainfall the fruit trees are looking much healthier, therefore we are looking at selling fruit when it ripens next year.

Finally we are trying to reduce the number of chickens we have at school over the summer. Therefore some of the older hens are available for sale at \$5 per hen. There are also some roosters to give away for any one interested.

I look forward to improving the profitability of the farm next year.

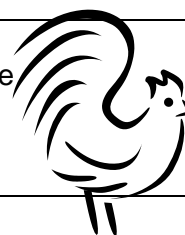

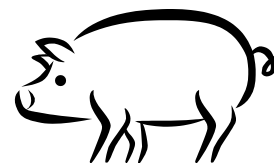
