Accidents at School

As a result of attending the RSPCA (Riverina Secondary Principals' Collegiate Association) meeting recently, all principals were advised to disseminate this information to the school community. This advice has been provided by the DEC (Department of Education and Communities, previously the Department of Education and Training).

If an accident occurs at School which is not caused by negligence of the Department then parents are required to have their own insurance. From time to time there are media stories about the issue of whether children are insured for injuries while at school. The Department of Education and Communities does not provide, nor has ever provided, accident or medical insurance for students enrolled in government schools. The department is however insured to cover the financial impact of any legal liabilities that it faces arising from its activities. If the department or one of its staff is negligent and this causes a student to be injured, then the student will be able to legally recover damages from the department (and the department's insurance will cover the cost). However, if an accident occurs at a school which is not caused by any wrongdoing or omission by the department, then the department is not legally

liable. Should parents wish to cover their children, there are various forms of insurance available, irrespective of whether fault can be assessable.

These include:

- *Student Accident Insurance – available through the Federation of Parents and Citizens' Associations of NSW and from commercial insurance suppliers;*
- *Sporting Injuries Insurance Scheme – covering catastrophic injuries;*
- *The Supplementary Sporting Injuries Benefits Scheme; and*
- *Private health funds.*

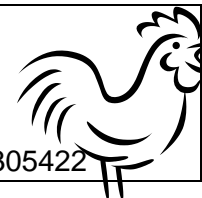

The implementation of national curriculum changes in English, maths, science and history for K-10 students will be delayed for NSW schools.

The NSW education minister, Adrian Piccoli said more time was needed to ensure high standards were maintained.

NSW schools can begin the planning phase for the new national curriculum by 2013, with the curriculum moving to the classroom teaching phase from 2014.

Years 7 and 8 PDHPE have been honing their netball skills with the girls being the dominant side so far. 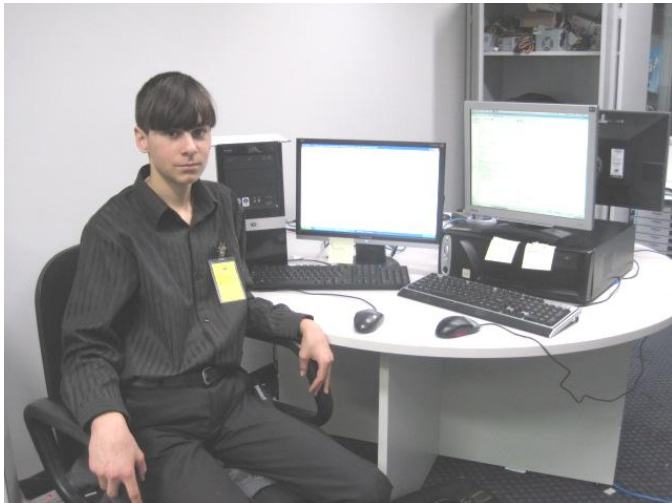

Measles vaccination reminder following spike in Sydney cases

NSW Health is urging people to ensure they are fully immunised against measles following a spike in the number of cases in the Sydney metropolitan region.

NSW Health Director of Health Protection Dr Jeremy McAnulty said seven cases of measles have been reported in NSW since the start of July.

“All seven cases were acquired in the Sydney metropolitan region where several adults in their twenties and thirties were infected,” said Dr McAnulty.

“This is a little unusual as most cases in NSW tend to be seen in unvaccinated or partially vaccinated people who have recently returned from travel overseas. The original source of their infection is unknown.”

Measles is a serious infection and can lead to severe complications. People with measles tend to be unwell and develop fever, cough, runny nose, sore eyes. A rash starts a few days later, starting on the face and spreads down the body.

“Anyone with measles is extremely infectious and just one person with the infection can pass it on to many others,” said Dr McAnulty.

The Measles Mumps and Rubella (MMR) vaccine is safe and effective and provides long lasting protection if two doses are given. As well as preventing measles, MMR vaccine also gives excellent protection against mumps and rubella.

MMR vaccine is given routinely at 12 months of age with the second dose given from 3½ to 4 years.

Many people in their twenties, thirties and early forties are still vulnerable to measles because they only ever received one MMR vaccine in childhood. People in this age group can see their GP for a free MMR vaccine and this is especially important for anyone planning travel anywhere overseas.

People born during or since 1966 who do not have documented evidence of receiving two doses of MMR vaccine or evidence of measles infection are at greatest risk of catching measles.

“If you think you may have measles, it is important to see your GP but make sure you call ahead so they can make arrangements to see you without exposing others in the surgery or waiting room,” said Dr McAnulty.

“In the early stages you might only have a cough, fever, sore eyes and a runny nose. Talk to your doctor before you go to the clinic.”
