2013 Organisation


Primary News

Year 2-3-4

After 'raising' plume moths over a period of 6 weeks students have come to the realisation that some things in nature are not there for a long time. Students watered the horehound plants regularly so that they could provide food for the plume moth caterpillars in their isolation chamber. Many moths hatched, laid eggs and died during the 6 week period. The Wakool Shire Council Weed Control Officer, Mr Battenally, came back on Monday 19th November to help with the release of the remaining moths and caterpillars which appeared to be very successful.

Year 4-5-6

It seems like only 2 months ago I met a group of excited students for the first time and we are now nearly at the end of the year.

This term has been a very busy one with not one but two excursions, visits from the travelling art gallery, all year 5 student nominating themselves for the Young Leader position, the Aspire Me Camp in Sydney, the National PSSA Athletics Carnival, Moulamein District PSSA Tennis Trials, orientation for the current Year 6 and future Kindergarten classes. We still have swim school, the gold excursion, Presentation Night, Whole School Assembly and Christmas lunch as well as the Outback Theatre For Young People running some drama workshops with all of the primary students to come.

It has been a very busy year and everyone in the class has shown some significant improvements throughout the year.

I would like to thank all of the parents for their support throughout the year whether you have been classroom helpers, professional taxi drivers or encouraging your children with home reading and learning activities. Without your support this year would not have been as successful as it was. Secondary News Bruce Neild (Head Teacher)

Directions for 2013

Continuing with our new model for the delivery of the HSC will see us provide additional support to students through the introduction of a mentoring program for students who choose to seek additional one-to-one support with planning for study and managing their time.

For all students there will be a renewed focus on the application of the How 2 Learn strategy in our school. We will do more student surveys and the improvement of feedback mechanisms should help students continue with their improvement. We will also implement a cross-curricular assessment model for Stage 4 students to reduce the number of assessments for Years 7 and 8 while helping students to make connections between areas of their learning.

English Year 7

The year began with a study of John Marsden's novel 'Tomorrow When The War Began' and writing diary entries. This progressed to reading a range of poetry from different cultures and times. In second semester we completed a close study of film and examined how meaning is constructed in different ways using film and its moral ideas. This led on to students' producing their own film with the winner being aired on Performance Night. Students completed a study of a post-modern picture book using questioning techniques and then went on to produce their own picture book with their own message.

English 9 and 10

In English students started with a media unit focusing on improving their arguing skills, followed by a close study of Steinbeck's classic novella, *Of Mice and Men.* In second semester students performed a critical study of Alfred Hitchcock's *Psycho*, creating some excellent posters to demonstrate both their knowledge of film technique and critical literacy concepts. This was followed by an examination of some science fiction concepts in literature.

History 7 and 8

Students in Years 7 and 8 enjoyed studying the Aztecs in particular this year, which was part of a unit of Colonisation and Contact History, where the colonisation of Central America was compared to the colonisation of Australia. Students also studied some of the core concepts of history, did some archaeology and studied Ancient Egypt. Next year, History for Years 7 and 8 will focus on the period between ancient and modern civilisations.



Australian History of the 20th century is the focus for students in Years 9 and 10, but this year in this class we also devoted a significant amount of time to developing research and independent learning skills. Students studied summarising and making connections in particular as well as the Whitlam Dismissal, The 1950s in Australia, Changing rights and freedoms in the 1960s and the Vietnam War.

Geography 9 and 10

In Stage 5 Geography, students explored issues from an Australian context and this year looked at how Australia fits in to its regional and global context. Human rights issues, including e-rights, were discussed by students. Students also examined issues closer to home including rural decline and spatial inequality, and how these affect our lives. This was the foundation for students to complete their own Research Action Plan.

Geography 7 and 8

This year students explored a range of environments including the Great Barrier Reef and rainforests. There was a focus on the basic skills of map reading and interpreting and presenting information in graphical formats. Students choose a global issue to study and suggested improvements as part of learning to become active and informed citizens.

Drama 9 and 10

Drama was well enjoyed this year, with many classes collapsing in a fit of giggles, especially when learning different facial expressions and tones of voice in Term 3. Students also developed improved skills in stage craft through these and other experiences including:

- Country Areas Program Days at Deniliquin Film
- Visit to Melbourne to see 'Boy Girl Wall'
- Performance of 'The Mad Hatter's Tea Party' at Performance night

Each student has shown an improvement in confidence and critical appreciation of performance this year and it is good to know that there is such a wealth of talent in our community.

English Year 8

Christine Connellan (Year 8 Teacher)

"At the Movies" - Term 4 with Year 8

Film is a powerful, narrative medium. Films have the power to transpose the viewer to another place & another time, to experience a range of emotions, and to reflect on life's important lessons. This Term, Year 8 studied the Gabor Csupo film, **'Bridge to**



Terabithia', a Walden Media and Disney Pictures co-production.

'Bridge to Terabithia' exposed the students to a vast array of stunning visual effects and cinematography, elements of fantasy, as well as special effects created by robotics and digital techniques. The film entertained the students through its touching portrayal of belonging, the rigors of rural-family life, the impact of schoolyard bullies, the power of friendship and the sadness of death. The movie focused on many life lessons through the day-to-day experiences of the main characters, as well as their creation of a fantastical land, where they defeat giants, trolls and mythical creatures. Ultimately, the message grasped by the students was that even tragedy can be overcome with insight, understanding and determination.

The students discovered that friendship and saving graces can be found in the most unsuspecting places; that true friends make us better people for having known them and it's important to be prepared to "build bridges" with our family, our friends and our foes, because that's what will give us direction and the strength to overcome obstacles in life.

Their study of **'Bridge to Terabithia'** provided Year 8 students with great scope for thinking, clarification of values, writing, speaking, listening, questioning, presenting understandings and ideas and employing technology choices in their responses.


Food Tech and Visual Art Belinda McKindlay (Food Tech and Visual Art Teacher)


Agriculture and TAS Term 4

Next year we will focus on growing out some merino lambs and breeding more stock. Year 9 students have been busy landscape gardening in an unused area in the main guadrangle and Year 7 have been busy tending their vegetable gardens in the hot weather. Year 7 TAS also made some terrific bridges out of paddle pop sticks. We have had a lot off testing them to see who had the strongest design. We had five students (Eden, Conner, Beau, Prue and Leighton) who designed a bridge that held in excess of 30 kg which is amazing.




