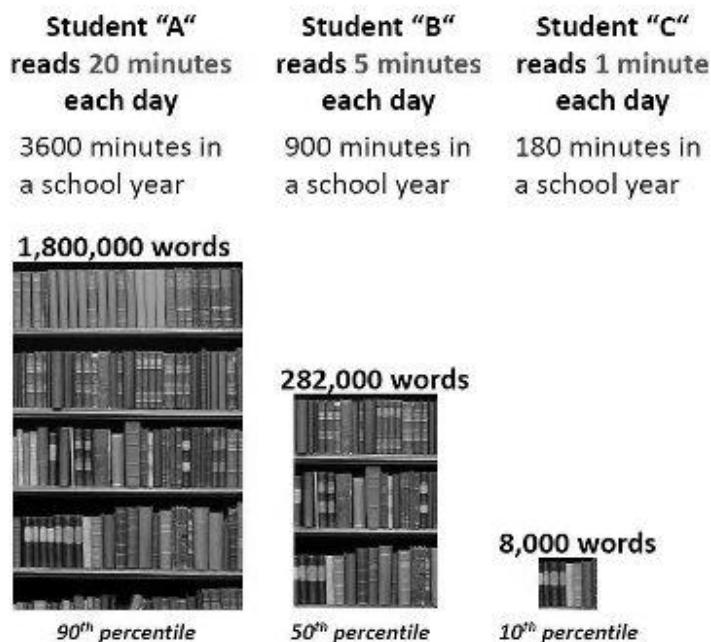

Student Organisation

Some students are still experiencing difficulties in adjusting to the start of the school year and ensuring that they have the right books for the day and their diary. The secondary department operates on a fortnightly timetable of ten days. This term, if it is an even numbered week, it is Week 2, if it is an odd numbered week, it is Week 1. This lack of organisation is affecting the GEM scores of some students and in the way of their chance to prove that they are doing their best.

To assist your child with their organisations a few help hints are:

- Help students to pack their bag the night before. Packing bags in the morning often means that things can be left out in the rush.
- When packing a bag in the evening, check your child's timetable and diary with them. If students have trouble understanding their timetable, they need to get Mr. Nield to make a visual timetable for them.
- Keep a close eye on the Bridge and the school's new Facebook page for upcoming events that will often require a note to be returned.

Extracurricular Activities

Drama Club continues to meet in the library each Monday, with students busily preparing for the Fairfax Festival at the end of the year. Students have been working on building up a repertoire of props for their performance. If you have any props you are willing to donate, get your child to consult Ms. Martin if they are suitable.

The ASX club has started trading this week and students need to ensure that they follow a clear strategy to ensure they trade successfully this term.

Science

Year 7 Science

David McCarron (Teacher)

Year 7 have made a pleasing start to Science. They have been busy learning about the science laboratory and safety. They have successfully conducted a number of simple experiments. Year 7 can now safely

light the bunsen burner and identify a number of pieces of science equipment.

Year 8 Science

Year 8 Science is studying Body Systems. They are learning about the human circulatory system at the moment. This topic studies the types of blood cells and how the blood supplies nutrients to the body.

Year 9/10 Science

David Giles (Teacher)

Year 9/10 are finishing their study of Human Reproduction and starting Chemistry. They will be learning about the elements and how they react with each other.

Senior Science

David Giles (Teacher)

Senior Science are finishing their study of plants and moving on to the human body. Working safely and WH&S issues will be the emphasis.

Visual Art

Belinda McKindlay (Teacher)

The Year 7 and Year 8 Visual Art class are starting the year with a unit on the different elements of design. The unit is an extension from last year for the Year 8 class and an introduction for the Year 7 class looking at colour, lines, shading, tone and shape.

The Year 7 class have explored Primary and Secondary colours by painting shapes of feet and moved on to cool and warm colours with their hands.

The Year 8 class have completed a colour wheel concentrating on tint and shade, created a tonal collage and are working on an original sketch with using all warm or all cool colours.

The students are experimenting with mixing and matching colours so they can complete their assessment task of a lolly canvas.

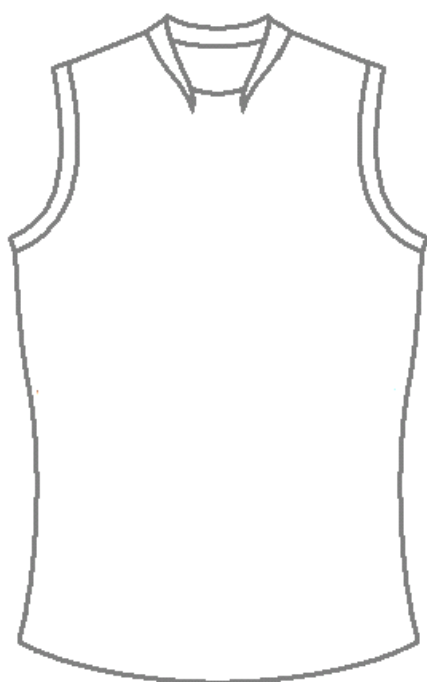

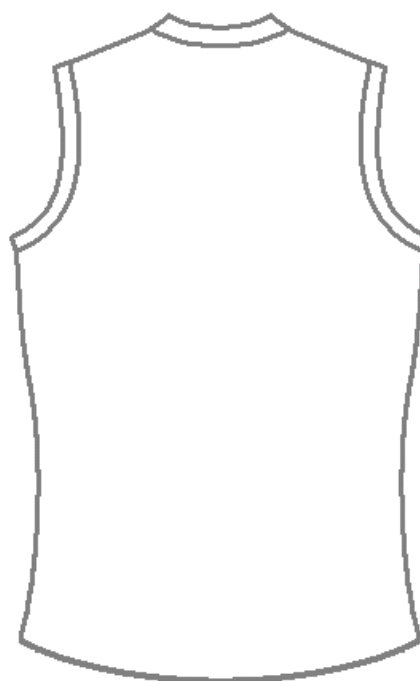

NSW School-Based Vaccination Program 2013

NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended for adolescents by the National Health & Medical Research Council (NHMRC) in a school-based vaccination program. Parent Information Kits are sent home to parents early in the school year. To consent to vaccination, parents are advised to read all the information provided, complete and sign the Consent Form and return it to their child's school.

HPV vaccination for boys from 2013

- In 2012, the Australian Government announced that human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine would be provided free to male students in high schools from 2013.
- From 2013, males in Year 7 in all NSW high schools will be offered HPV vaccine annually.
- In addition, males in Year 9 will be offered the vaccine as part of the national 'catch up' program in 2013 and 2014.
- **Males who are 14-15 years of age in 2013 and who are in Year 10 can receive free HPV vaccine at their GP during 2013 only:**
 - it is important when making the GP appointment that the receptionist is informed of the reason for the visit and that sufficient time is allowed (at least three working days) for the vaccine to be ordered and delivered to the GP
 - GPs should contact their local Public Health Unit on 1300 066 055 to order each vaccine dose.
- HPV vaccination will continue to be offered annually to female students in Year 7 only.

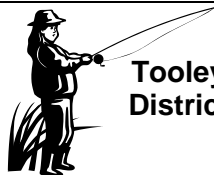
HAVE YOU RECEIVED THE SCHOOLKIDS BONUS?

Do you know about the Schoolkids Bonus? It is a new cash payment to help eligible families and students with the costs of primary and secondary school studies. Around 1.2 million families have already benefitted from the first wave of payments in January 2013 – *have you?*

If you receive a family or income support payment, including Family Tax Benefit Part A, you could be eligible to receive \$410 a year for each primary student and \$820 a year for each secondary student, with half paid in January and half paid in July.

The Schoolkids Bonus replaces the Education Tax Refund (ETR) and is a much simpler system. You no longer need to collect receipts and payments are made automatically so you don't have to wait months to make a claim via your tax return. Unlike the ETR you can choose how you use the payment to best support your children's education – whether it be school books, stationery, uniforms, school fees, or excursions.

Check your eligibility by visiting australia.gov.au/schoolkidsbonus and if you think you might have missed out on the January payment, contact Centrelink – either in person at a Centrelink-Medicare Office or by calling 132 468.

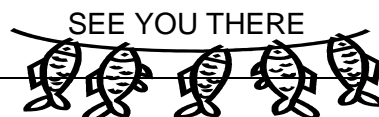

Prohibited employment declaration

Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998



The Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 makes it an offence for a person convicted of a serious sex offence (a prohibited person) or a Registrable Person under the Child Protection (Offenders Registration) Act 2000 to apply for, undertake or remain in, child-related employment. It does not apply if an order from the Industrial Relations Commission or the Administrative Decisions Tribunal, declares that the Act does not apply to a particular person.

Section 5 of the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 defines a serious sex offence as an offence involving sexual activity or acts of indecency that was committed in NSW and that was punishable by penal servitude or imprisonment of 12 months or more even if the sentence was not served, or, an offence involving sexual activity or acts of indecency that was committed elsewhere and that would have been an offence punishable by penal servitude or imprisonment for 12 months or more if it had been committed in NSW.

Child-related employment means any employment that primarily involves direct contact with children where that contact is not directly supervised. Section 1 of the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 specifies that child-related employment is employment:

- involving the provision of child protection services
- in pre-schools, kindergartens and child care centres (including residential child care centres)
- in schools or other educational institutions (not including universities)
- in detention centres (within the meaning of the Child (Detention Centres) Act 1987)
- in refuges used by children
- in wards of public or private hospitals in which children are patients
- in clubs, associations or movements (including of a cultural, recreational or sporting nature) having a significant child membership
- in any religious organisation
- in any entertainment venues where the clientele is primarily children
- as a babysitter or childminder that is arranged by a commercial agency
- involving fostering or other child care
- involving regular provision of taxi services for the transport of children with a disability
- involving the private tuition of children
- involving the direct provision of health services
- involving the provision of counselling or other support services for children
- on school buses
- at overnight camps for children.

Under this Act:

- it is an offence for a prohibited person to **apply for, undertake or remain** in child-related employment
- employers **must** ask existing employees, both **paid** and **unpaid**, and preferred applicants for employment to declare whether they are a prohibited person or not
- all child-related employees **must** inform their employers if they are a 'prohibited person' or remove themselves from child-related employment. A prohibited person is someone who has been convicted of a serious sexual offence or, who has had a finding for a charge of serious sexual offence proven in court, even if a conviction was not recorded.
- penalties are imposed for non compliance.

I am aware that I am ineligible to apply for, undertake or remain in, child-related employment if I have been convicted of a "serious sex offence" as defined in the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 or if I am a "Registrable Person" under the Child Protection (Offenders Registration) Act 2000. I have read and understood the above information in relation to the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 and understand my responsibilities and obligations under this Act.

I declare that I am not a person prohibited by the Act from seeking, undertaking, or remaining in child-related employment.
