A reminder to parents about the operation of school speed zones around the Easter holidays.

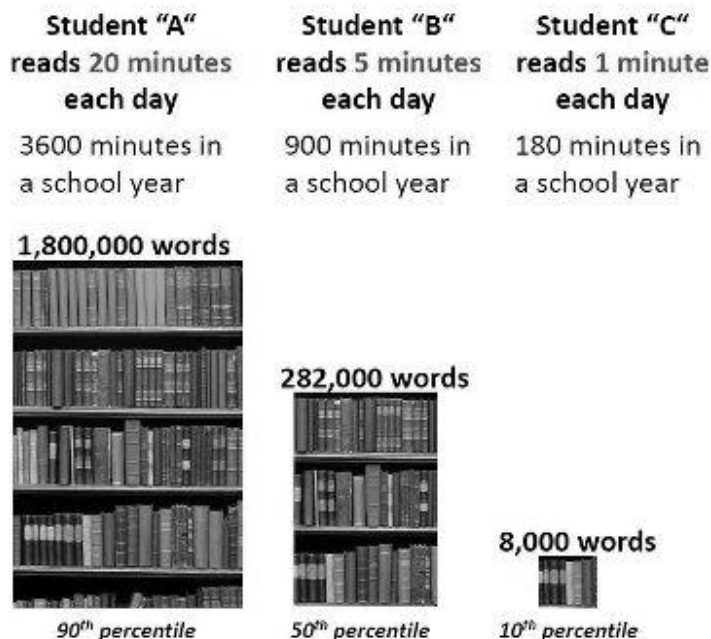
School zones exist for the safety of children and families; they will operate on Thursday 28 March, then resume on Tuesday 2 April.

How 2 Learn

As everyone knows, schools exist so children can learn, but do children really think that? Are schools a place to go for a while to meet some friends and avoid working too hard? What was your approach to school as child? Why does your child think they go school every day?

As an executive in the NSW teaching service, I get told a lot of things about what I should be doing to make children learn better. These people usually use very big words to tell me how make things simpler so people can learn better – a contradiction I often find amusing. That aside, having trained as a social researcher before entering teaching, the research by John Hattie (which is driving state and federal education policy at the moment) is not only an accurate analysis of learning, it is actually useful to see what everyone can do to improve a student's learning.

Most of what can be improved relates to teacher practice, especially in the provision of meaningful feedback to students about their progress. However, two key areas that are beyond a teacher's control stand out. These areas are things that students must do improve their learning. They are:

- A student's disposition to learn
- Beliefs about intelligence

Essentially, this boils down to believing that you can get better at learning ('smarter'), that everyone can become more 'intelligent' and that you go to school focus and ready to learn – because you thought that was why you went to school. To simplify the research, doing this makes a student progress through their learning nearly **TWICE** as fast.

This why I wrote articles like this one last year in the Bridge about the How 2 Learn strategy, why when the Year 8 to 10 students were away at the beach last week, we introduced the How 2 Learn strategy to Year 7, and why we are beginning to introduce it Primary students this term. The sooner students change their perception of learning; the easier it is for them to improve their learning outcomes.

As various debates about education go on in the media about school funding (which I hope we win), it is also important to remember the things we can do to improve our children's learning without money. One of the best is a conversation about why students should be interested in learning – or better yet, what

you learn in the workplace or home and why learning skills are ones that they will need for the rest of their lives.

Year 7/8 Geography

Anna Martin (Teacher)

Year 7 and 8 have been studying Global Issues in Geography this term. They have been researching globalisation and how it affects them on a personal, community, country and global scale. They are becoming more aware of global issues such as food shortages in Africa, pollution crisis in India and deforestation due to palm oil production in South East Asia. They have an interesting assessment task due this term where they must video themselves reporting on a crisis of their choice as a Channel 10 news reporter!

Year 9/10 Geography

Leeta Rutherford (Teacher)

This term the Year 9 & 10 students in Geography have been exploring the environment, landforms for Australia and some of our close neighbours. They have begun so exploring weather, climate and vegetation types with reference to how these are connected. While the students explored landforms they looked at continental drift. They undertook an activity which demonstrated how geologists and other scientist have worked out how our current landforms where connected.

History 7-10

Bruce Nield (Teacher)

History this year so far has been a detailed overview of what each class will be studying for the rest of the year. This is an option within the new History curriculum that enables students to get a broader picture of a historical period so that they can more easily make links across the content of the course as the year progresses.

Years 7 and 8 are focusing on the transition from the Ancient to the Modern World this year in History. This will involve a study of the Polynesian expansion across the Pacific, The Black Death in Asia, Europe and Africa, and Italy. Years 9 and 10 will be studying India 1750-1918, The Industrial Revolution and Australians at War in World Wars One and Two. Focus on skills-based learning in History has been in the use of Information and Communications Technology with research methods appropriate to the study of history. Collaborative group learning practices for the workplace have also been a focus in researching specific areas as a team and then sharing knowledge with a new team.

Surf Camp, Year 8, 9 & 10 **Belinda McKindlay (Teacher)**

Students from Years 8, 9 and 10 and staff members Mr Giles, Mrs Martin and Mrs McKindlay spent a week in Anglesea on Surf Camp. The excursion stayed at the Anglesea Life Saving Club right on the main beach. After a long 10 hour journey on Monday the students awoke to a beautiful, sunny Tuesday morning. The first activity was a sample of river kayaking in the morning followed by a surf carnival in the afternoon. The hardest event at the carnival was the little known crab stick/chicko roll. An early night and then straight in to it on Wednesday with a 2 hour surf lesson followed by a rugged mountain bike ride through the bush surrounding Anglesea. Thursday morning the surf was a touch flat but our seasoned surfers made the most of the conditions and caught loads of waves. The final activity for the trip was a snorkelling experience and then a night on the town for fish and chips or pizza.

Students and staff would like to thank all the parents for their generosity in donating meals, snacks and produce for the camp. All students pitched in with the daily chores, were well behaved and everyone had a real go at all activities. We would like to thank Julie and Riley McNab for their fundraising efforts and donating the profits to our camp.

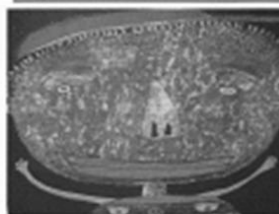

Nutritious after school snacks

Children often need snacks after a busy day at school. Since snacks can be an important part of a child's diet it is important to make them nutritious. Here are some ideas for easy and nutritious snacks:

- Carrot or celery sticks with peanut butter
- Fresh, canned or dried fruit
- Low fat yoghurt or custard
- Glass of low fat milk, plain or with milo
- Sandwich, with salad fillings
- Crumpets, English muffins or toast with low fat toppings and/or low fat cheese
- Plain popcorn

Parents should be breakfast eaters too!

A recent study showed that parental breakfast eating was the most important factor in determining whether adolescents will eat breakfast. We know that there are a number of benefits to eating breakfast daily, including better concentration during the morning, better vitamin and mineral intake, appetite control and higher metabolic rate. So parents, set a good example: eat breakfast everyday to encourage your children to do the same.

A healthy breakfast should include wholegrain breads and breakfast cereals, fruit and dairy foods (low fat for kids over 2 years of age).

When in a hurry, try a liquid breakfast such as a milk Milo or Up & Go, or grab a slice of fruit bread. For something different on the weekends, the whole family can join in making breakfast. Try pancakes or pikelets topped with stewed fruit, poached eggs on toast served with grilled mushrooms or tomatoes or baked beans or creamed corn on toast.

Prohibited employment declaration

Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998

NEW SOUTH WALES
DEPARTMENT
OF EDUCATION
AND TRAINING



The Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 makes it an offence for a person convicted of a serious sex offence (a prohibited person) or a Registrable Person under the Child Protection (Offenders Registration) Act 2000 to apply for, undertake or remain in, child-related employment. It does not apply if an order from the Industrial Relations Commission or the Administrative Decisions Tribunal, declares that the Act does not apply to a particular person.

Section 5 of the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 defines a serious sex offence as an offence involving sexual activity or acts of indecency that was committed in NSW and that was punishable by penal servitude or imprisonment of 12 months or more even if the sentence was not served, or, an offence involving sexual activity or acts of indecency that was committed elsewhere and that would have been an offence punishable by penal servitude or imprisonment for 12 months or more if it had been committed in NSW.

Child-related employment means any employment that primarily involves direct contact with children where that contact is not directly supervised. Section 1 of the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 specifies that child-related employment is employment:

- involving the provision of child protection services
- in pre-schools, kindergartens and child care centres (including residential child care centres)
- in schools or other educational institutions (not including universities)
- in detention centres (within the meaning of the Child (Detention Centres) Act 1987)
- in refuges used by children
- in wards of public or private hospitals in which children are patients
- in clubs, associations or movements (including of a cultural, recreational or sporting nature) having a significant child membership
- in any religious organisation
- in any entertainment venues where the clientele is primarily children
- as a babysitter or childminder that is arranged by a commercial agency
- involving fostering or other child care
- involving regular provision of taxi services for the transport of children with a disability
- involving the private tuition of children
- involving the direct provision of health services
- involving the provision of counselling or other support services for children
- on school buses
- at overnight camps for children.

Under this Act:

- it is an offence for a prohibited person to **apply for, undertake or remain** in child-related employment
- employers **must** ask existing employees, both **paid** and **unpaid**, and preferred applicants for employment to declare whether they are a prohibited person or not
- all child-related employees **must** inform their employers if they are a 'prohibited person' or remove themselves from child-related employment. A prohibited person is someone who has been convicted of a serious sexual offence or, who has had a finding for a charge of serious sexual offence proven in court, even if a conviction was not recorded.
- penalties are imposed for non compliance.

I am aware that I am ineligible to apply for, undertake or remain in, child-related employment if I have been convicted of a "serious sex offence" as defined in the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 or if I am a "Registrable Person" under the Child Protection (Offenders Registration) Act 2000. I have read and understood the above information in relation to the Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998 and understand my responsibilities and obligations under this Act.

I declare that I am not a person prohibited by the Act from seeking, undertaking, or remaining in child-related employment.
