Science Week 2013 Miss Rutherford (Science Pre-Service Teacher)

Last Wednesday (14th) Year 8 and Kinder participated in Science Week activities. Science Week occurs every year to celebrate science. This year's main focus was 'A century of Australian science'.

First the Year 8's discussed Science Week and the main focus, they talked about some of the science research and life changing discoveries Australian scientists have been responsible for. They then undertook constructing marble tracks – this was an extension from the class learning they have been doing about simple machines.

The Kinder students were brought up to the new Science Lab for their Science Week activities. They were firstly shown different parts of the room and they asked questions about different items. They then

listened to Miss Rutherford's brief talk about Science Week.

After this the Kinder students moved to the back of the room and undertook an experiment involving sand.

At first normal sand was poured into the water and the Kindergarten students watched what happened – it sank, was wet and when a finger was put into the water it got wet. Then blue sand was sprinkled onto the water – it floated. All the Kindergarten students took turns putting a finger into a container of water and blue sand. As seen in the photographs below, their fingers came out dry with a little bit of the blue sand on them.

The red sand was then poured into the water quickly. It sank but clumped together and the Kindergarten students stated it reminded them of pieces of playdough. When the sand was scooped out it was completely dry (as seen in the photograph below)

Moulamein District PSSA Athletics Carnival



Perseverance

As part of the school's use of the How2Learn strategy, this term we have started to focus on Perseverance. In brief, this quality makes for successful learners as it enables learners to overcome difficulties with their learning and understand that with enough effort a level of success can be obtained. Students need to remember that:

- It's okay sometimes to stop doing something when we are frustrated, as long as we promise ourselves we will come back to it once have refocused.
- To remember that the problem or task at hand is not a reflection of you as a person - Not being able to do one thing at a certain time does not mean you will never be able to do it - it just means you can't do it <u>YET</u>.
- To try different ways of thinking about or solving a problem or answering a question you find difficult. Just because one way hasn't worked doesn't mean others won't.

Stage 6 Computing Applications

Students are creating quality products in Computing Applications at the moment with the first draft of their edited films being displayed on Performance Night on the school's new Apple iMac. 



Information sheet for applicants

How to apply for a Working with Children Check Clearance

Note: Subject to conditions, existing child-related workers in the Department of Education and Communities are not required to apply for a Working with Children Check (WWCC) Clearance until the relevant compliance date as prescribed in the Child Protection (Working with Children) Regulation 2013. For further information, please contact your relevant human resources area for advice.

The application process for a WWCC Clearance is as prescribed by the Children's Guardian. For the full conditions, please visit the website at http://www.kids.nsw.gov.au/.

Who needs to apply

If you are required to obtain a Working with Children Check (WWCC)
Clearance as a condition of employment or engagement in child-related work, and you are not an existing child-related worker in the Department, you must apply for the Clearance as issued by the Children's Guardian (if you don't have one already).

How to apply

 Complete the online application form which can be accessed at: http://www.newcheck.kids.nsw.gov.au.

If you cannot access the online system, call the Children's Guardian customer service on (02) 9826 7627 and an officer will complete the application form for you.

- Once you have made an application, you will receive an application number.
- Present your application number to a NSW motor registry or Government Access Centre, along with proof of identity (which consist of the same proof required when applying for a NSW drivers licence).
 For information about the NSW Motor Registry or Government

of NSW Motor Registries and Government Access Centres.

 Once your application has been processed, the Children's Guardian will notify you of the outcome by email or post.

You will not be employed by the Department if you do not receive a WWCC Clearance number.

Cost

Non-volunteer clearance

A person with a non-volunteer clearance can be engaged in either paid or unpaid child-related work.

An application fee applies (\$80 as of 15 June 2013) which is paid for by the person applying for the clearance.

Volunteer clearance

A person with a volunteer clearance can be engaged in unpaid child-related work. An application fee does not apply.

What records are checked

The WWCC process obtains applicants' national criminal histories from CrimTrac. Records include: convictions (spent or unspent), charges (whether heard, unheard or dismissed) and juvenile records.

Workplace misconduct findings are also

considered. If a misconduct investigation finds that sexual misconduct, including grooming, or serious physical assault of a child has occurred, nominated reporting bodies must report this finding.

If the outcome of a WWCC is a clearance, the child-related worker will be subject to ongoing monitoring for relevant new records during the period that your WWCC Clearance is valid.

Validity

If you receive a WWCC Clearance, the Check is valid for 5 years (from the date it is granted), unless it is cancelled sooner by the Children's Guardian or if you surrender it sooner.
