This was also the day the large "Boatel" passed under the bridge and students enjoyed watching that event.


These stories are written by the children during independent writing were they are encouraged to be self-sufficient and resourceful when writing. This means the students have produced these writing samples largely independently.

Being able to find information in the room and not being afraid to make mistakes allows students to enjoy the writing process and feel successful in their endeavours to become writers and share their stories.



Electives 9 -10

- Line Three: Food Technology OR Industrial Technology

Year 10 students also have the option of studying VET Metals and Engineering or Automotive on Tuesdays.

Electives 11 - 12

Due to work placement commitments, some students are yet to return these forms. They need to be returned to the front office or Mr. Nield as a matter of urgency to ensure that the learning intentions of these students can be recognised and acted upon.

English **HSC English**

Bruce Nield (HSC English Teacher)

HSC English students are currently completing their final unit on 'Belonging'. In this Area of Study students have explored what it means to belong, not to belong and barriers to belonging. The main text for this unit of work has been Steven Herrick's 'The Simple Gift'. It is a story of a boy who runs away from the city to find a new life in a country town. Teake has given this book his personal stamp of approval. Students have also been exploring creative writing and the creation of images in narrative for their final HSC examinations.

Years 7-10 English Recent Recap Chris Connellan (English Teacher)

Year 7 have studied the Morris Gleitzman classic, Two Weeks With The Queen. This is a contemporary Australian text, which Australian teenagers relate well to and are challenged by. It explores the relationships which are important to Colin, the young protagonist, as he matures and comes to terms with his little brother's incurable cancer and approaching death. Interwoven into the



Education & Communities story are the issues of: brotherly love, grieving, tolerance & acceptance, selfishness & selflessness and growing up. It is a deeply moving novel and yet it is also quite humorous. Two Weeks With The

Queen provides great scope for thinking, clarification of values, writing, speaking, listening and presenting understandings and ideas. The unit will culminate in a folio of visual and written responses to the novel.



Year 8 have enjoyed a *poetry unit*, with a difference! The popularity of Aussie ballads has never waned since the earliest days of colonial settlement. Up until the mid 20th century most Australian ballads were enjoyed in the form of poetry. Since then, traditional poetry has declined in popularity giving way to ballads in the form of songs & rap lyrics. Through a close study of a range of Australian ballads throughout history, students learnt of the importance of ballads to tell stories which entertain as well as influence an audience's view of social, cultural and ethical issues. They have explored texts critically, evaluating content, differentiating between fact and

opinion, challenging points of view and identifying, considering and appreciating cultural expressions. The unit culminated in some very impressive and creative slideshow representations by the students.



Year 9 & 10 students have changed their attitudes towards William Shakespeare. They now resoundingly believe that even after over 400 years, Shakespeare is still relevant as a storyteller, entertainer, philosopher and word-smith. They have been enriched through a study of his popular play -The Tragedy of Romeo and Juliet, a thoughtprovoking play about two teenagers, which still resonates with teenagers today. They sharpened their investigative journalism skills to answer the probing questions: 'Who was to blame for the deaths

of Romeo and Juliet?' and "What lessons are to be learnt?' The results suggest that "Four Corners" could be knocking on our door, scouting investigative talent, in the near future!





Conjunctivitis

Conjunctivitis is a common eye infection, especially among children under five. It is an inflammation (swelling and redness) of the conjunctiva which is the clear membrane that covers the white part of the eye and the inner surface of the eyelids.

Causes

Conjunctivitis can be caused by an infection (virus or bacteria), which is highly contagious, or by an allergic reaction which is not contagious.

You could develop conjunctivitis if you come into contact with:

- Discharge from the eyes, nose or throat of an infected person through touch, coughing and sneezing
- Contaminated fingers or objects
- In summertime, conjunctivitis can be spread when kids swim in contaminated water or share contaminated towels
- You will remain infectious as long as there is a discharge from your eye

Signs and symptoms

Conjunctivitis can be caused by an infection (virus or bacteria) or by an allergic reaction. It is not always clear which type of conjunctivitis is present, because both cause redness and swelling of the conjunctiva. Symptoms usually develop within 24 to 72 hours of becoming infected and last from two days to three weeks.

Bacterial Conjunctivits

Both eyes are almost always infected with bacterial conjunctivitis, although it may start in one eye. There is likely to be a gritty feeling and pus.

Viral Conjunctivitis

Conjunctivitis from a virus may involve one or both eyes, causing red itchy eyes with a discharge.

Allergy

If the inflammation is the result of an allergy, there are often other signs of hay fever, including itchy nose and sneezing or a history of other allergic conditions. The eyes are itchy and watery.

Other Symptoms

- redness behind the eyelid, spreading up the white of the eye
- swelling of the eye/s, appearing puffy
- excessive tears
- a discharge from the eye, which dries when the child sleeps, causing crusting around the eyelids
- photophobia (a dislike of bright lights)

Treatment Viral conjunctivitis

There is no specific treatment, it will get better on its own. Gentle cleaning of the eyes with cotton balls soaked in warm water may help them feel better. Clean in one direction only (either towards the nose from the outside in, or away from the nose, whichever is easier) discarding the cotton ball each time to prevent recontamination. DO NOT CLEAN INSIDE THE EYELIDS AS THIS MAY CAUSE DAMAGE TO THE CONJUCTIVA.

Bacterial conjunctivitis

May need antibiotic ointment or drops from your doctor. Treatment should be applied to both eyes, even if only one eye appears to be infected.

Allergic conjunctivitis

May be helped by treatment used in conditions such as hay fever eg antihistamines.

Follow-up

See a doctor if your child has:

- severe pain
- problems with their vision/eye sight
- increased swelling, redness, and tenderness in the eyelids and around the eye
- is generally unwell and has a fever (temperature over 38°C)

Key points to remember

- Conjunctivitis can be an infectious or allergic condition: if infectious it is often highly contagious
- Symptoms last from two days to three weeks
- Be sure to wash hands with warm soapy water often to prevent the infection spreading to others
- Do not share eye drops, tissues, make-up, towels, or pillowcases with other people
- Children with conjunctivitis should be kept home from childcare and school
- The child is infectious until discharge from eye has disappeared

SWIMMING AND WATER SAFETY EDUCATION A MUST

Australia is surrounded by water and has inland water ways, rivers, lakes and dams, so it is essential that our Australian school children possess water safety and survival skills, such as floating, sculling and treading water. These skills are best practised in a well supervised and structured swim lesson, so as to be properly guided by an accredited Aust swim Teacher about important water safety techniques and skills and be equipped with invaluable water safety knowledge. 50,000 children will leave primary school this summer unable to swim, making them extremely vulnerable to drowning when they are anywhere near water. At absolute minimum children should be able to swim 50 meters, float for 2 minutes and be able to practise basic rescue techniques before they leave primary school. Parents are to ensure that children are constantly supervised in and around water and that they receive regular Learn to Swim and Water Safety aquatic education in a fun, engaging and safe environment. Learn to swim provides your children with important skills and confidence to be able to enjoy water safely. Information sheet for applicants

How to apply for a Working with Children Check Clearance

<u>Note:</u> Subject to conditions, existing child-related workers in the Department of Education and Communities are not required to apply for a Working with Children Check (WWCC) Clearance until the relevant compliance date as prescribed in the *Child Protection (Working with Children) Regulation 2013*. For further information, please contact your relevant human resources area for advice.

The application process for a WWCC Clearance is as prescribed by the Children's Guardian. For the full conditions, please visit the website at <u>http://www.kids.nsw.gov.au/</u>.

Who needs to apply

If you are required to obtain a Working with Children Check (WWCC) Clearance as a condition of employment or engagement in child-related work, and you are not an existing child-related worker in the Department, you must apply for the Clearance as issued by the Children's Guardian (if you don't have one already).

How to apply

 Complete the online application form which can be accessed at: <u>http://www.newcheck.kids.nsw.gov.au</u>.

If you cannot access the online system, call the Children's Guardian customer service on (02) 9826 7627 and an officer will complete the application form for you.

- Once you have made an application, you will receive an application number.
- Present your application number to a NSW motor registry or Government Access Centre, along with proof of identity (which consist of the same proof required when applying for a NSW drivers licence).
 For information about the NSW Motor Registry or Government Access Centre near you, telephone 13 22 13. See next page for a full list

of NSW Motor Registries and Government Access Centres.

- Once your application has been processed, the Children's Guardian will notify you of the outcome by email or post.
- You will not be employed by the Department if you do not receive a WWCC Clearance number.

Cost

Non-volunteer clearance

A person with a non-volunteer clearance can be engaged in either paid or unpaid child-related work.

An application fee applies (**\$80** as of 15 June 2013) which is paid for by the person applying for the clearance.

Volunteer clearance

A person with a volunteer clearance can be engaged in unpaid child-related work. An application fee does not apply.

What records are checked

The WWCC process obtains applicants' national criminal histories from CrimTrac. Records include: convictions (spent or unspent), charges (whether heard, unheard or dismissed) and juvenile records.

Workplace misconduct findings are also

considered. If a misconduct investigation finds that sexual misconduct, including grooming, or serious physical assault of a child has occurred, nominated reporting bodies must report this finding.

If the outcome of a WWCC is a clearance, the child-related worker will be subject to ongoing monitoring for relevant new records during the period that your WWCC Clearance is valid.

Validity

If you receive a WWCC Clearance, the Check is valid for 5 years (from the date it is granted), unless it is cancelled sooner by the Children's Guardian or if you surrender it sooner.
