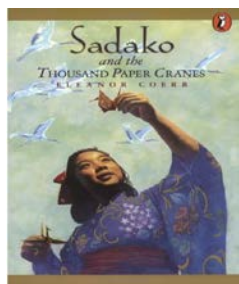
## Secondary News

### Term Four Years 7 -10 English Wrap

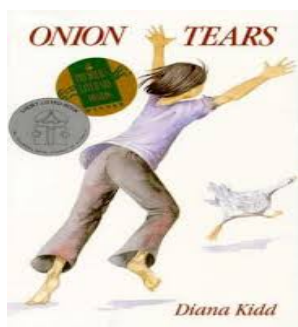
Term 4 has been a very busy time of consolidation, revision and in the latter half of the term, transitioning to the next level of difficulty in our English studies. As always, there has been an emphasis on improving our reading, comprehension, sifting through textual evidence, using digital technology effectively, spelling, grammar, punctuation and sustained writing. The following is a glimpse of just the “highlights of our Term 4 programs for Years 7 – 10, to list everything would take a whole newsletter in itself!

**Year 7** have studied the non-fiction text, ***Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes***, the story of a little girl who contracts leukaemia ten years after the end of World War 2, due to exposure to the radiation of the nuclear bombs dropped on Hiroshima. Immersion in a non-fiction text gave the students a new perspective on historical events and the enduring after-effects of a nuclear war. By interacting with a character, such as Sadako, students developed empathy. Finding an authentic way to relate to another person is a vital life skill. Through empathy, they developed a deeper critical awareness of their personal viewpoints of the text and the history and culture it chronicled.



**Year 8** enjoyed studying the novel ***Onion Tears***, which is the story of a child refugee, whose family suffered persecution after their collaboration with Australian troops, during the Vietnam War. After Nam Huong’s daring escape from Vietnam with her grandfather, she witnesses his death at sea. She arrives in 1980’s Australia, not knowing a soul and unable to speak the language. She is settled with a foster family in Melbourne and is desperately worried about her family back in Vietnam. ***Onion Tears*** highlights the crippling effects of post-traumatic stress on child refugees, as well as the hopeful resilience of children who with the right support were able to forge ahead and benefit from freedom and education.

The students noted that many Vietnamese refugees, like Nam Huong, then went on to be highly successful doctors, scientists, engineers, artists and business operators – adding to the wealth of our nation.



**Year 9** studied Aboriginal Experience with a focus on the film ***“Rabbit Proof Fence”*** which is the story of courage, determination and leadership of Molly, a fourteen year old Aboriginal girl who runs away from Moore River Aboriginal Settlement in 1931, with her sister Daisy (8) and cousin Gracie (10). These girls had previously been removed from their mothers, as part of AE Neville’s policy of separating mixed blood Aboriginal children from their mothers. The girls defy all odds to travel 1500 miles through unfamiliar territory to return to their land, their homes and families in North-Western Australian desert country, with the authorities chasing them all the way. ***“Rabbit-Proof Fence”*** gave students the opportunity to reflect upon a time in Australian history, which many had not heard about before.



**Year 10** concentrated on creating their own anthologies of literature which reflected an area of study of their own choice. Anthologies dealt with a wide variety of issues, including racism, drugs in society, heroism, war, grief, women’s rights and freedom. In the second half of the term, the Year 10 class strapped themselves in for their Focus HSC course journey.

### LOTE Year 7/8

#### **Leeta Rutherford (LOTE Teacher)**

This year the students have explored culture in Germany through looking at traditional Fairy-tales from there and sports and hobbies that are played/watched in Germany. As a part of the Fairy-tale unit the students got to make and decorate a Gingerbread house. Students have also learnt how to introduce themselves and hold a very brief conversation. They then built on this knowledge and created annotated albums of family members and pets. For the final part of Term 4 the students have been exploring Christmas in Germany especially looking at some of the traditions that influence our Christmas’ in Australia. Fröhliche Weihnachten!

### Music Year 7/8

#### **Leeta Rutherford (Music Teacher)**

This year the students have explored music from around the world as well as what music means for them. They have used the computers to help them undertake tasks. For the first part of Term 4 they were able to choose an aspect of music to explore. For the second half of Term 4 the students have been exploring Christmas carols –

the history and how they can be changed. The students have attempted to change carols.

### **Geography 9/10**

#### **Leeta Rutherford (Geography Teacher)**

The students this year have undertaken Geography through practical activities which have involved individual and group/partner tasks. The students addressed the various aspects of Geography through undertaking research tasks, creating posters, writing letters to officials, holding a debate, etc. I wish all the best to the students for next year, especially those entering Stage 6 studies.

### **Science**

#### **Leeta Rutherford (Science Teacher)**

It has been a quick start the new learning year for all students in year 8 to 12 for Science. Each class has already or will soon have completed their first unit. The Year 8's have just undertaken and completed the Physical World unit 'Energy', the Year 9 and 10's have just undertaken and completed the Chemical World unit 'Chemical Reactions'.

By the end of this term the Stage 6 Biology class will have undertaken and completed their first unit 'Patterns In Nature'. They are currently undertaking the assessment task for this unit which is due on Monday 15<sup>th</sup> December.

### **PDHPE**

#### **Ben Miller (PDHPE Teacher)**

Swim school 2014 was a great success with many students learning and practising important skills related to safer fun in the water. Already 2015 has some exciting plans with the twilight swimming carnival set for week 2 along with the surf camp being run later in the term. #### **Year 8 Technology Mandatory**

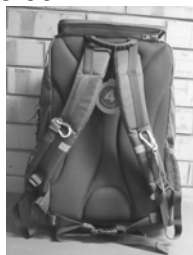
