
Check In Assessments

All students who had a valid Day School permit on the 7th of August will be able to attend school until the 21st of August. We are currently planning and exploring a range of options to support student learning for these students after this date. Victorian students who reside within the 'Blue Zone' are still able to attend school with a current permit.

'Narrow your Focus'

Practicing narrowing our focus in simple ways can help us narrow our focus on what matters when life gets overwhelming.

As humans, we have a tendency to spend lots of time replaying the past or worrying about the future (who can relate?), and narrowing our focus can help bring us back to the here and now... which is where our control and ability to take action really lies!

What do I mean by narrowing your focus? I mean reducing the amount of things you are giving your attention to, and a great way to do this is to be extra curious about the things we are already doing. For example, I could narrow my focus when drinking a cup of tea by noticing the warmth of the cup in my hand, the feel and texture of the liquid in my mouth, and the muscles in my throat as I swallow.

Have a play with narrowing your focus this week... it's fun! If you have young children, hijack their curiosity and see or experience something like a child seeing or experiencing something for the first time. All that is required is a willingness to try, and a sense of curiosity. It doesn't need to take long either – narrow your focus for 10 seconds or 10 minutes, you choose!

You could try...

- Getting on your belly and seeing what you can find in the grass
- Notice what you're feeling in one part of your body, and name the feeling
- Describe a colour you can see as if you were describing it to someone who is blind

- How many water drops can you count on a single blade of grass?

UPDATE: Cross Border School Information @ Friday 7th Aug, 8.41 pm

Dear Parents and Caregivers

The temporary closure of the NSW-Victoria border, which was implemented to contain the spread of COVID-19 from Victoria and to protect the health and wellbeing of NSW residents, remains in force.

The border zone is defined as townships along the Murray River including Mildura, Wodonga and Echuca on the Victorian side.

Under the amended Public Health Order, any person who already has a valid day school visitor permit will continue to be able to use this permit for 14 days, until midnight on Friday 21 August. This permit will expire after Friday 21 August.

It will be replaced with a special schools permit for children who attend special purpose schools. Any child or staff member in the Border Zone will be able to continue crossing the border to attend school or work as long as they stay within the Border Zone.

The changes include:

- Staff and students who reside within the border zone, on either side of the NSW-Victoria border, are permitted to cross the border to attend a school located in the border zone by obtaining a Border Zone Resident Permit.
- Victorian residents who reside outside of the border zone will not be able to enter NSW to attend school unless they obtain an exemption.
- Victorian residents who reside within the border zone but attend a school outside the border zone will not be permitted to cross the border without an exemption.
- HSC students and HSC teachers who reside beyond the Victorian border zone can travel to NSW schools provided they have been granted an exemption.
- All other Victorian staff and students who reside beyond the border zone will be supported to learn and work from home.
- Students attending a School for Specific Purposes will be eligible for a special permit through the NSW Government website.

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A guide to NSW school students for Term 3

All students should be learning on campus unless they are unwell or have a medical certificate to support their absence.

All students and staff who reside or have visited Victoria must have a <u>permit to enter NSW</u> and are required to comply with health restrictions relevant to their permit which may include the need complete the 14 day self-isolation period commencing the last day they were in Victoria.

NSW Health has requested anyone, particularly those who have been in Victoria who is unwell or has flu-like symptoms arrange to be tested through their local medical practitioner or one of the COVID-19 clinics.

Schools continue to be safe, and operations are in line with Australian Health Protection Principal Committee (AHPPC) and NSW Health advice. Under this advice, schools are not required to conduct widespread temperature screening or for anyone to wear masks.

All schools will be vigilant when implementing infection control, physical distancing and personal hygiene protocols to protect the health and safety of students and staff. Schools will promote the need to follow good hygiene practices like:

- regularly washing hands
- avoiding sharing drinks or food
- coughing or sneezing into your elbow, or a tissue which should be discarded immediately
- filling water bottles from bubblers rather than using the bubbler directly.

The activities that are permitted at school will be conducted in a way that is safe and appropriate in the current environment. Those that remain on hold will be reviewed during the term and will recommence when appropriate based on health and other relevant advice.

School attendance

Remember not to send students to school if they are unwell, even if they have mild symptoms. Schools will make appropriate arrangements to return students home if they become unwell at school.

Students should be at school unless:

- they have a medical certificate which states that they are unable to return to school due to an ongoing medical condition and the expected timeframe
- they are currently unwell.



Activities under consideration from Term 3

The following events will be reconsidered in Term 3. For now, these events must remain on hold.


- Kindergarten orientation
- School camps
- Excursions (other than field trips explained above)
- Parent attendance at assemblies and other school events (e.g. graduation ceremonies or student speech events)
- Parent volunteers e.g. parent reading helpers (note: canteen and uniform shop volunteers are permitted)
- Interstate excursions.
- School-based activities that involve large gathering of adults are not permitted at this
 time. These include parent/community gatherings such as parent functions, working
 bees, fundraisers, school BBQs, large parent information evenings, and large on-site
 cultural events. These large gatherings and the following activities will continue to be
 reviewed and assessed based on AHPPC and NSW Health advice and may be permitted
 at a later date.
