#### **Check In Assessments**

Earlier this term, Year 5 and 9 students participated in their 'Check In' Assessments. These assessments were compiled by the NSW DoE to 'check in' on students' progress as NAPLAN assessments didn't occur this year. These assessments have provided valuable information to teachers on each student's progress and the cohort as a whole. Our results overall are extremely pleasing achieving above state average in all but the Year 9 Numeracy tests and achieving at or above Similar School Group in all tests. This is a fantastic achievement and demonstrates the high quality education that students receive at Tooleybuc Central School.

#### School Improvement Plan

Our Year 3 students have undertaken these assessments this weeks and their results will be published early next term.

#### Attendance

Attending school every day is a huge indicator for student success. Currently we are aiming for **ALL** students to attend **AT LEAST** 95% of the time. Our current data shows that only 57.9% of our school are attending 90% of the time. This is something that we will be working very hard to improve.

Even if your attendance is 90% this means still that :

- Your child will miss approximately 20 days in a school year
- Over their primary schooling this adds up to nearly 3 terms of their schooling.
- Over their entire schooling this adds up to 5 terms, which is an entire school year and one term.

If your child is under 85% without a justified reason the school Home School Liaison Officer (HSLO) will expect an explanation. Please don't forget that it is a requirement that every school absence is explained.

We do however understand that during COVID times we do need to be much more vigilant in staying away if we are unwell. It is also a timely reminder that if you child is absent due to flu-like symptoms the NSW Department of Education requires that they have a COVID test before they return to school.

Year 12 have one more week of school. I am sure they will spend this holiday period studying hard and preparing for their exams. They have one more week of classes.

#### Foundation – Creative Thinking & Augmented Reality with Miss Rutherford.

On Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> September it was International Dot Day and the Foundation students participated in. Earlier in the year we had read the book 'The Dot' by Peter H Reynolds and undertaken creative thinking and STEM tasks linked to the story. January is just another month in the summer break for current tertiary students, but for recent school leavers it means one thing — <u>university</u> <u>offers</u>. #### The ATAR is a rank, not a mark.

The Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) is a number between 0.00 and 99.95 that indicates a student's position relative to all the students in their age group (i.e. all 16 to 20 year olds in NSW). So, an ATAR of 80.00 means that you are 20 per cent from the top of your age group (not your Year 12 group).

Universities use the ATAR to help them select students for their courses and admission to most tertiary courses is based on your selection rank (your ATAR + any applicable adjustments). Most universities also use other criteria when selecting students (e.g. a personal statement, a

questionnaire, a portfolio of work, an audition, an interview or a test).

#### Special Loan fee exemption – (COVID 19) VET Student Loans for Your Training at TAFE

The Australian Government announced a sixmonth exemption of the 20 per cent loan fee for full fee-paying VET Student Loan and 25 per cent loan fee for FEE-HELP students. This exemption applies for VET Student Loan and FEE-HELP amounts incurred on census days between 1 April 2020 to 30 September 2020. Students will not need to do anything for the exemption to be applied. Student's VET Student Loan debt or HELP debt records with the Australian Taxation Office will also reflect the loan fee exemption. The loan fee may still appear on Fee Notices and Commonwealth Assistance Notices (CANs) issued by TAFE NSW; however, the loan fee will be exempted as per the details above (subject to legislative amendments).
