
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Louisa's Thoughts

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Compulsory School Attendance



Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all childron between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
 Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption
- Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- · being sick, or having an infectious disease having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you absence.

assence. Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

decision with you and the reasons with. Phincipals may decusst medical carificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to dises. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is derived, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Abaneos reliating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total abaneos for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referal to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support retories. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Laison Program to device an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Prosecution in the Local Court

Prosecution in the Local Court School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your childs full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

Online Podcast Training

On Wednesday 29th of March, Steph Aceglav took Year 10 English, Year 11 English and Year 12 English Studies students through the process of making a podcast from scratch. In groups, students had to think of a topic and a title for their podcast. We had some great topics including a Typical Day at TAFE, The first round of Central Murray Football, Handling Stress in Year 12, Online Gaming and Disney Musicals.

Next students had to write and share their introductions before going on to finish their scripts.

Once they had recorded the podcast Steph showed them how to add music to the opening and closing of their podcasts.











Mathematics with Mr Wolfe



For Year 8 and 9, maths had a relaxing reintroduction this term with a trip down to the river to put their creative mathematical minds to the test.

Both year groups were taken down to sit by the water as I led them through what ended up being almost a meditation session for many. The students all sat in a large circle facing outwards so that they

could not see each other, then for 1 minute, they were all silent listening to the sounds around them. Over the course of the minute each student had to write down all the sounds they could hear. Among the things heard were water flowing, leaves rustling, trucks blaring, birds chirping and more... it was quite a relaxing atmosphere indeed.

Next, the students fell silent for one minute again, this time focusing on the things they could see; standing trees, fallen trees, the river, leaves on the ground and more.

Students were then tasked with getting creative by exploring how they could apply mathematics to the world around them, they created problems that used the world around them as the subject. For example Alyssa in Year 8 wrote 'If the trees were 20 metres tall on average, and there were 100 trees, how tall would they be if you stacked them all one on top of the other?' Riley in Year 9 wrote 'How many leaves are there within a 5 metre radius of me?'

There were many other wonderful and creative questions asked that I wouldn't have even thought to ask myself. The goal of this lesson was to show that maths is used to model our world, and questions don't come from a textbook, but rather from questions we can ask about the real world. Many people view maths as numbers on a page, and in my class this term I will be focusing on removing this stigma, showing that maths is relevant to us all.
